Access to Care Survey: Lake County Residents' Barriers to Healthcare

LCGHD is looking to learn about barriers that may prevent Lake County residents from receiving proper healthcare through a 2024 Access to Care Survey. This survey is being conducted by the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) & Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) Partnership to gain insights into the issues that prevent Lake County residents from receiving needed healthcare services.



The public's participation is essential to this process, and their responses are greatly appreciated.

It's a brief survey (also available in Spanish) and participants DO NOT need to provide their name or contact information on the survey.



Participants may only answer questions they are comfortable answering. Answers will be confidential, and only summary information from all respondents will be reported. No identifying information will be shared that can compromise individual's privacy.

Look out for the pictured weekly posts on our Facebook page about the survey so that you, your family, or your clients know where to take it; or, scan the QR code to be taken to the survey. Participants must be at least 18 years of age and currently live in Lake County, Ohio to complete the survey.

Ohio WIC encourages all WIC programs across the state to celebrate and educate families about the importance of WIC and how the service improves health outcomes from women, infants, and children.

August is also Breastfeeding Awareness Month, and WIC is committed to supporting women in their breastfeeding goals. There will also be local WIC breastfeeding peers available at the party to educate and inform the public about Ohio's Breastfeeding policies, and how to make breastfeeding work for you. For this event, WIC is partnering with a number of Lake County community agencies to provide information about other local resources that are available in the area. Preparedness: Plan for Your Pets!

As beloved members of your family, it's important to be sure your pets are included in your family emergency plans. How can you make sure your pets are included? Here are some tips:

Make a plan. You should make sure your family plan includes things like:

- Having a plan for what to do with your pet if you must evacuate your home. Often, public shelters do not accept pets. It's important to know a place ahead of time that will be safe to take your pets if an emergency happens.
- Consider a microchip. This will help locate your pet if you get separated. Make sure if you have one, you keep your address and contact information current, and you have a designated emergency contact outside of your immediate area in case it is hard to reach you.



Make an emergency kit for your pet. Just like you, your pet will have urgent needs in an emergency. It's best to keep their kit in a waterproof and airtight container and include things like:

- Several days' supply of food
- Medicine
- Backup collar with ID tag and harness or leash, and copies of your pet's registration information
- Traveling bag, crate, or sturdy carrier for each pet, if possible
- Grooming items
- Picture of you with your pet to help document ownership and assist in case you become separated from your pet.
- Familiar items like favorite toys, treats, or bedding to help reduce stress for your pet.

Keep Informed

- Have a way to get information, like wireless alerts so you get warnings for your area. Lake County uses a Wireless Emergency Notification System that you can sign up to get texts, calls, or emails. (<u>https://entry.inspironlogistics.com/lake_oh/wens.cfm</u>)
- Listen to local officials when you're told to evacuate or shelter in place.
- Always bring your pets indoors as soon as there are signs of a storm or other kind of emergency.

Overdose Emergency Boxes: Easy Access to Life-Saving Medication

LCGHD is happy to provide businesses, community organizations, and other public locations with wallmounted, overdose emergency boxes that allow bystanders easy access to life-saving medication called naloxone when an overdose is suspected. Naloxone (also known as Narcan®) is a medication that can reverse an overdose caused by an opioid drug (heroin or prescription pain medications) and prevent overdose death. When administered during an overdose, naloxone blocks the effects of opioids on the brain and quickly restores breathing.

Naloxone has no potential for abuse and DOES NOT reverse overdoses that are caused by non-opioid drugs, such as cocaine, benzodiazepines (e.g. Xanex, Klonopin and Valium), methamphetamines, or alcohol. After naloxone is administered, 911 must still be called immediately so that emergency medical services (EMS) can take the patient to the hospital for monitored treatment.

Currently, overdose emergency boxes can be found at the Kirtland Library, Kirtland Community/Senior Center, Kirtland Schools, Willoughby Public Library, Willowick Library, Marous Brothers Construction in Willoughby, and Mar-Bal, Inc. in Painesville. LCGHD is working to expand availability to other public areas within Lake County.

Kits and Training

LCGHD can train businesses, organizations, and community members on how to recognize an overdose, distinguish between different types of overdoses, and administer naloxone. Naloxone kits and materials are provided free of charge, courtesy of funding from the Ohio Department of Health. Environmental Health

Environmental Health Increases Staff for a Busy Summer

This summer, LCGHD's Environmental Health department increased its staff by 50% to accommodate the extra busy summer season:

- 7 Additional Mosquito Larval and Surveillance Staff. *Mosquito spraying has begun! The mosquito larval staff are responsible for identifying and treating areas of active mosquito breeding. The surveillance staff are responsible for collecting, counting and shipping mosquitos to the Ohio Department of Health for West Nile Virus testing.*
- 4 Mosquito Truck Drivers. The night drivers operate the spray trucks as needed throughout the summer to maintain a consistent spraying schedule for identified areas.
- 1 Beach Staff Member. The Beach staff sample Mentor Headlands and Fairport Harbor Beaches daily for the presence of E. coli and harmful algal blooms.
- 1 Stormwater Specialist. *The stormwater staff assist with screening storm drain outfalls for the presence of contaminants.*
- 5 Operation and Maintenance (O&M) Water Sampling Staff. *The O&M staff sample discharging septic systems.*
